




FROM THE DESK OF THE HEADMASTER

CELEBRATING ONE HUNDRED ISSUES OF THE WESTCLIFF DIARY

As we begin a new academic year, I offer a warm welcome to those pupils and parents new to the WHSB community, as well our returning pupils, their parents, the staff, Old Westcliffians, and friends of the School.

This is a particularly special edition of The Westcliff Diary, as it represents our 100th issue. In marking this special issue, we have taken the opportunity to look back over some of the reports and articles included in previous editions, including those first issues in the early 1990s, and have shared some of the content with you through these pages. These exercises are always fascinating, as they serve to remind us of the speed with which our world, society, and politics can shift, as well as the many important developments which have taken place within our own School. Equally, these reviews can feel rather frustrating as, through just a few pages, it is impossible to convey the breadth of material included over the years. However, we have begun to share some of the material more fully through displays in our Centenary Room, and those are to be reviewed and refreshed periodically.

The Development of our School Magazine

In his book Westcliff High School for Boys: A Centenary History, Dr Alan White records: "From 1920 through to the 1980s, life at Westcliff in its various dimensions was chronicled in the School magazine. In its first incarnation the magazine was called The Gateway. In 1931 it became The Quest, and remained so until 1964. when it was renamed The Westcliffian. Over the first fifty years of its existence the appearance of the magazine changed scarcely at all. Its cover was white, blue or (most frequently) battleship grey, unadorned by any illustration other than the School crest. The typeface used was a sober Times New Roman. In 1971, however, a new-look magazine appeared, its style and content radically changed. On its cover was a photomontage depicting different aspects of School life. Inside far more space was given over than had previously been the case to pupils' creative writing and art work. Excluded were the notes on the activities and achievements of the School's four houses which had previously been one of the magazine's main features, an omission defended by its new editor on the grounds that the house system now played only a 'minor role' in the life of the School. The decision to give the magazine a facelift is not hard to understand. It had fallen behind the times. It may not have looked particularly dated during the 1950s, but by the end of the 1960s, thanks to a decade of fast-paced social and cultural change in Britain, it did."

By the late 1980s, it became clear that *The Westcliffian* had been wavering in its relative success, and the need to revisit and develop the School's magazine was evident.

The Westcliff Diary was introduced under the leadership of my predecessor, Mr Andrew Baker, in September 1990. The development was intended to bring a more focused commentary on the life and development of School matters. It became the principal means by which the School communicated with parents, and of course that remains so today.

Throughout the one hundred editions of The Westcliff Diary, the calendar of events (included on the back cover) has remained an important means for sharing the termly programme of events and activities with pupils, parents, Old Westcliffians, and friends of the School. Whilst the content has necessarily shifted and developed over the years, it is interesting to note that a programme of well-established activities and events has endured throughout the School's 104 years, and this programme remains relevant and important to us today. Although we continually review and update our programme and the format of many activities, our traditions remain important and firmly embedded, and that is reflected throughout the annual calendar across the years.

With improved access to printing and publication facilities, and with the need to continually review and update to facilitate effective communication through a lively and attractive format, *The Westcliff Diary* has continued to evolve into the format we recognise today.

In 2012, I chose to revise the format to increase opportunities for staff and pupils to contribute articles and other items, whilst retaining the commentary on School news and events, alongside our termly calender. Further adaptions to the format were made in April 2017, resulting in the format with which our current School community will be familiar.

As noted above, we consider The Westcliff Diary one of the most important means of communication with parents concerning School updates, reminders, news, and, importantly, the calender of events for the forthcoming term. Pupils and parents are continually reminded of the importance of participation in the wider life of the School, and this is central to our Learner Profile. Through regular and varied participation, pupils gain self-confidence, extending their knowledge, skills. understanding, and friendship groups. Without doubt, balancing academic commitments with involvement in extracurricular activity can have a profound impact on good mental health, and academic and future achievements. The importance of participation is reinforced through each edition of The Westcliff Diary.

I hope you enjoy the news, and summaries of events and activities taking place this term, as well as the pages we have prepared in celebration of this, our 100th issue of *The Westcliff Diary*. I am pleased to welcome you to the start of this new term, and to bring you up to date with some exciting developments which have taken place during July and August.

Extra-curricular Activities and Events in the Summer Term

Those readers who follow our School News and Facebook pages will be aware of the frequency with which our pupils, through the application of their hard work, skills, and talents, succeed at the highest level. A quick review of the Summer Term news highlights pupils succeeding in regional and national competitions in Languages, Mathematics, Debating, Biology, Public Speaking, Essay Writing, Rugby, Tennis, Warhammer, gaining powerboat qualifications, and the list goes on.

Equally, with thanks to Mr Barber, the Heads of House, and House Captains and Vice-Captains, our House

System goes from strength to strength, providing our pupils with a broad range of opportunities for participation, and I am proud of the many pupils who engage with the House activities programme in support of their House.

Clubs and societies offer pupils further opportunities to explore new and varied interests and hobbies, and I am delighted at the continued high levels of attendance at, and participation in our clubs. I am ever grateful to our dedicated staff who support this programme, and to those students who also put forward their ideas for new clubs and societies, to keep our offer relevant and stimulating, and to those students who also run and supervise the clubs.

The summer term also saw the continuation of a lively programme of trips, field trips, Duke of Edinburgh expeditions, and CCF field days. Furthermore, many of our dedicated pupils and staff gave their time to participate in charity events, both in and out of School, to help raise funds for charities such as Havens, and HARP. I am proud of them all for their efforts in making a difference to the lives of many in our local community.

On the athletics field our pupils continue to excel, and on Saturday 6 July I was delighted to attend the ESAA National



Athletics Final, this year in Stoke-on-Trent, to see the WHSB Inter Boys, and Junior Boys Athletics Teams perform at an astonishing level. Impressive performances from our Intermediate Boys Team earned them the podium position of Third in the country, with 571 points, which is an exceptional achievement at this level. No less impressive were the performances of our Junior Boys Team, who exceeded their own target for the day, gaining 548 points and placing them fourth nationally. Within these pages, we have included some of the official photographs of these performances, so that our readers can share in that occasion.

The School was also thrilled to win not one but two National Schools Theatre Awards (NSTA) for our production of Les Misérables in March this year. Following five-star reviews of the production, the School was shortlisted in a number of categories, winning Best Actor in a Musical, and Best Male Musical Solo, at the Awards Ceremony in London in June. Jacob Guyler (last year's Upper Sixth) won Best Actor in a Musical, for his performance in the vocally demanding role of Jean Val Jean. In an NSTA review, Jacob's rendition of Bring Him Home was described as "particularly moving, showcasing the raw emotion and vocal prowess required of the role." Best Male

Musical Solo winner was Gabriel Williams (Lower Sixth), for *Master of the House*, which was brilliantly performed with Edith Jefferson (Upper Sixth), earning recognition from the NSTA in its review as "a comic highlight", and "a standout performance".

These opportunities would not be possible without the dedication, commitment, and encouragement of our superb staff, and I wish to record my gratitude to them for their ongoing support and hard work towards our extra-curricular programme, which is second to none.

I cannot emphasise strongly enough how important it remains for pupils to engage with as broad a range of activities as possible, for their personal development, and future success.

Replacing the Main School Roof

A major project has begun to replace the original roof on our main School building, which dates back to the mid-1920s, and this is now well underway. Pupils, and those visiting the School, will have witnessed the arrival of the extensive scaffolding which, following weeks of construction, now surrounds our main School building. The main School roof has been failing for a number of years, and we have been fortunate to secure grant funding in excess of £1 million from the Education and Skills Funding Agency to enable the School to complete this much needed project.

Replacing a roof on such a large scale is potentially highly disruptive, and we have sought advice and support from a firm of experienced construction and property consultants in planning and overseeing the progress of this project, to keep disruption to a minimum. As in previous years, we have maximised use of the School closure period during the summer break to carry out some of the most disruptive aspects of this work. I am delighted that good progress had been made and we are on target for completion of this project in December. Much of the work is, naturally, weather dependent, and therefore we shall need to monitor progress carefully, and to work around any related difficulties.

The presence of the scaffolding and contractors on site inevitably impacts on the appearance of some areas of the site, and I apologise that the School environment will not be looking its best this term! However, the prospect of a new, watertight roof for Christmas is very good news indeed.

I would like to record my thanks to Mr Rothon, Director of Finance and Accounting, for his outstanding support to me in connection with oversight and monitoring of this major project.

Maintaining School Facilities

Despite the disruption to the site created by the roofing works, our general programme of maintenance and refurbishment continues within the School buildings. However, we have had to be more conservative in releasing funds for such work this year, due to the significant financial challenges faced within our sector. With many schools now recording deficit balances, annual expenditure must be scaled back and that could impact on the School site and facilities over time.

One of the most pressing projects in connection with our sports facilities, is the need to replace the 'tartan' specialist running / long jump track, as this has been badly damaged by regular flooding from the road adjacent to the lower School field over many years. To replace this facility and associated equipment, we have set a fundraising target of £50,000. This is clearly a significant sum, and we cannot achieve the replacement without your support. There are a number of ways in which parents, Old Westcliffians, and friends of the School can contribute towards addressing these difficulties, and Mr Rothon has provided further information on how you can help on page 12. Should anyone wish to discuss with me any potential support they may be able to offer, please contact Mrs Holley, my Personal Assistant. Thank you for any support you are able to offer.

On the matter of fundraising, I would like to record my thanks to our wonderful Parents' Association who continue to support the School in so many ways, through their presence at events, and

We are pleased to welcome a number of staff new to the School this term. Miss Aunkumar joins the English Department. Earlier this year, it was with great sorrow that I accepted the resignation of Mr Bleakley following his exceptional service to the School over a period of 15 years. Mr Bleakley has decided to leave the teaching profession to pursue a new venture, this being a great loss to WHSB. Mr Bleakley has been a loyal and dedicated colleague, who has contributed greatly to many different areas

of School provision across those 15 years, and our School community is richer for those contributions.

Mr Bleakley is a highly talented and respected schoolmaster and it has been a privilege to work with him since I returned to the School in 2010, and since taking on my position as Headmaster in 2012. Pupils over the years have benefited immeasurably from his thorough command of Chemistry; he has inspired confidence in them because they know he believes in them, and he will always go the extra mile on their behalf. At the same time, they have been in no doubt as to Mr Bleakley's expectations of them; the commitment he expects from them in relation to their studies, and their responsibilities in holding themselves to a high

standard when it comes to their conduct and character. That is why Mr Bleakley has consistently commanded their respect and admiration.

Mr Bleakley has been enormously industrious during his time at WHSB. I was delighted to offer him the opportunity to take on a pastoral role in the early days of his career, as it was evident to me that his commitment and work-ethic were second to none. As the record attests, this proved to be the case, as I have been delighted offer him further promotions, to the position of Progress Leader, then to Head of School, Director of School, and latterly Assistant Head. He has developed into a highly experienced pastoral leader and brought that experience to bear on significant improvements in our SEND and Safeguarding provision.

Standing tall amongst Mr Bleakley's outstanding contributions to the School is the invaluable support he gave to me when setting up the CCF, and his own significant role in its development. I have often reflected that it almost appeared fated that I should find such a kindred spirit in matters CCF upon returning to WHSB. Having recently departed from a grammar school with a thriving CCF, I believed this would be a good fit for WHSB. Such was my impatience following appointment, that before taking up my post I was already in communication with the Ministry of Defence and had gained the Governing Body's support for a CCF. That, however, was the easier part, as ensuring an effective implementation and development was quite another matter. The prospect of a CCF at WHSB was quite a culture shift for

many and there was much to be done to successfully embed this unfamiliar offer. In this regard, Mr Bleakley's shared passion for the CCF was invaluable, and indeed necessary, and I remain indebted to him for his unfailing support in taking this provision forward with such skill and diplomacy.

I recall our early meetings with the Ministry of Defence's 'powers that be', and navigating their then labyrinthine bureaucracy to launch the WHSB CCF with, at the time, just one officer (Mr Bleakley!) and 25 cadets. We now have a hugely successful three Service CCF which is amongst the best in the land. It is enormously popular and contributes greatly to the positive culture of the School. Many former pupils who have benefited from service in the WHSB CCF since 2012 have remained in touch with Mr Bleakley and his colleagues in the CCF; indeed, many return to CCF events to keep in touch. Surely that is great

testament to Mr Bleakley's commitment, warmth, generous character, and the high regard in which they hold him.

I hope that Mr Bleakley will take with him considerable pride in the enormous contribution he has made towards the CCF at WHSB, and I am delighted that he shall be remaining an adult volunteer with our CCF, alongside our other colleagues who also volunteer.

My senior colleagues and I marked Mr Bleakley's departure with a farewell dinner, and we were also pleased to make a well-deserved and special presentation to him at our staff social event at the end of the Summer Term. We wish him every success in his next venture, working alongside colleagues we know are most fortunate to have him on board.

ANNUAL SPEECH DAY Thursday 7 November 2024



Our annual Speech Day provides pupils, parents and staff with an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of pupils throughout the School during the past academic year. The evening is a compulsory attendance for all students in Year 11, and the Lower and Upper Sixth, and we anticipate that more than 900 pupils, parents, staff and other guests will be in attendance.

This year, we are delighted to welcome Vice Lord-Lieutenant, Rear Admiral Roy Clare CBE as our Guest of Honour for our special evening. Admiral Clare became Vice Lord-Lieutenant in 2022.

Admiral Clare was born in London and joined the Royal Navy as a Junior Seaman. He served at sea on the lower deck before entering Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth (BRNC). He passed out as a Sub Lieutenant in 1972, winning that year's

Queen's Sword. He was First Lieutenant of HMS Bronington in 1976 (Commanding Officer: HRH The Prince of Wales) and had five sea commands, including HMS Invincible. He was Commodore BRNC before serving in NATO as a Rear Admiral.

In 2000, Admiral Clare retired early from the Royal Navy to become Director of the National Maritime Museum and Royal Observatory, Greenwich. He was made CBE 'for services to museums' in 2007 and became Chief Executive of the Museums, Libraries and Archives Council. Between 2010 and 2017 he was Director of Auckland War Memorial Museum, New Zealand.

Admiral Clare and his wife, Sarah, have three adult children and two granddaughters. They have lived in Essex for more than 20 years, in the coastal village of Tollesbury. He is a non-executive Trustee in charities in the fields of the arts, heritage, digital inclusion and social welfare. President of SSAFA in Essex and a Councillor on Tollesbury Parish Council, he has been a Deputy Lieutenant for Essex since 2018.

We look forward to welcoming Admiral Clare to Westcliff High School for Boys in November, and to celebrating our pupils' outstanding achievements.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

As we begin a new academic year, once again I remind parents and pupils of the importance of full and sustained attendance at School each day, and to emphasise the impact of the continuity of education on a pupil's attainment.

The majority of our pupils continue to maintain superb attendance records and they, their parents and the staff at WHSB take appreciable pride in the commitment and determination of all involved in maintaining strong attendance records.

Despite national reports of falling School attendance since the months of lockdown in 2020 and 2021, and the impact of the virus since, I am pleased to say that attendance at WHSB has remained strong. We do, however, notice a dip in the attendance of a small number of individuals, and such a pattern must be avoided at all costs.

Attendance is closely monitored by our Pastoral Teams and we continue to evaluate and follow-up any concerns. Every year, our data indicates a strong correlation between absence and lower levels of progress. It is one of the most significant variables affecting a pupil's academic progress and final grades. An absence of just one day can present a pupil with significant challenges in catching up on missed work whilst endeavouring to keep up in lessons, as the pace of lessons at WHSB is fast.



There is, of course, sometimes an exceptional case to the general rule, however I wish to remind parents that requests for leave of absence for holidays during term time will not be granted. Given its impact on educational performance, maintaining outstanding levels of attendance for every pupil remains a priority for the School. It is also important that parents and School are as one in emphasising this message to pupils.

We are grateful to parents for their continuing support in prioritising full attendance in order to maximise the opportunity for their son/daughter in reaching his/her full potential.

INTRODUCING THE WHSB LEARNER PROFILE TO PUPILS NEW TO WHSB

The purpose of education at WHSB is to nurture and support pupils in unlocking their full potential through academic and personal development. The School's Learner Profile outlines how we endeavour to achieve this by promoting and developing its seven attributes in our pupils. The Learner Profile helps ensure that pupils, parents and staff all understand what we strive to do at WHSB, supporting a consistent and coherent approach to our work each day.



SUMMER 2024 EXAMINATION RESULTS

In a record-breaking year for A Level results at Westcliff High School for Boys, our students achieved the School's best ever examination results with 21% of entries graded A* and 56% of all entries graded A* or A. In addition, a remarkable 83% of all entries were graded A*, A or B. There were many superb individual performances, with 30% of students achieving A* and A grades in all their subjects. Eighteen students achieved three or more A* grades, including Gerald Ayittah, Teddy Bulpett, Rory Keeble, Jacob Mellor, Will Midwinter, and Quddus Okunola who achieved four A* grades. Nine students obtained places at the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge and the overwhelming majority of students will be undertaking courses at prestigious Russell Group Universities.

Our GCSE pupils also deserve our congratulations this year with 75% of all results being graded 9-7. A remarkable 26% of all results achieved grade 9 (the top grade). This is an outstanding performance, with pupils rising brilliantly to the challenge

presented by the GCSE examinations. 126 pupils (70% of all Year 11 pupils) achieved 8 or more 7-9 grades, 36 pupils achieved a total of 12 or more 7-9 grades, and 14 pupils (Aakaash Jonathan Arul Dhinakar, Varun Ayyappan, Adam Belhaj, Conan Chen, Divij Gupta, Frank Highmore, Sriniketh Prabhu, Sebastian Puddick, Lawrence Stone, Vincent Varney, Aaryan Vatsa, Ethan Wan, Daksh Yadav, and Aqeel Zaman) achieved 12 9-8 grades. Varun achieved a remarkable 12 grade 9s, and Aaryan was the highest performer in the country in GCSE Economics.

These results are well deserved and reflect the pupils' hard work and commitment. The staff have provided terrific support for the pupils and they also deserve congratulations and recognition for the outstanding teaching and guidance they have provided for our pupils. Collectively, our A Level and GCSE results place Westcliff High School for Boys among the highest performing schools in the country. I congratulate all our pupils and staff on their success and thank our parents for their support.

Rafael, our new School Captain, has participated in a broad range of activities at School. Many will know him for his superb performances on stage, most recently in Les Misérables. Targeted Appeals

In the Summer Edition of the Westcliff Diary, we announced our intention to launch targeted appeals, to enable parents, alumni, or other supporters of the School to donate a sum for a specific activity or project. The following much-needed areas of provision have been identified:

Athletics Facilities & Equipment

SAFEGUARDING: SMOKING, VAPING, CANNABIS USE AND ALCOHOL

World Health Organisation

The School seeks to educate its students about the dangers of substance abuse in all its forms. This article which looks at smoking, vaping and alcohol use draws on a recent global report on the behaviour of young people and the decisions that they make and how those decisions affect their health, both in the short-term and long-term.

Research from the World Health Organisation (WHO) suggests that tobacco smoking among children is much less common than it used to be - one in five 15-year-old girls said they had never smoked a cigarette - but smoking rates are still higher among girls than boys in England and Wales. However, there is a upward trend in young people taking up vaping. The WHO report confirmed that vaping rates have overtaken cigarette smoking in most countries, with nearly one in ten 11-year-olds (Year 7) saying that they have used a vape at least once, rising to 26% of boys and 40% of girls by age 15. It appears that what starts as experimentation at an early age can lead to habitual use by the time that young people enter their GCSE years (Years 10 and 11). Vaping rates in the UK are above average, compared to other countries. Even though vaping is thought to be much less dangerous than smoking, the risks of children breathing chemicals into their lungs are not yet fully understood.

It is evident that the rapid emergence of youth vaping has completely changed the landscape of adolescent substance use in the United Kingdom. While nicotine remains the most common substance encountered in vaping devices, cannabis vaping is now reported by one-third of youth who vape, and is on the rise within Essex according to information received from Essex Police. Although cannabis vaping is thought to generate fewer toxic emissions than cannabis smoking, it has been associated

with several cases of acute lung injury and often involves highpotency forms of cannabis, exposing youths to several acute and long-term health risks. The low perceived risk of cannabis as a substance, and of vaping as a mode of consumption, may bring a false sense of security and be particularly appealing for youth who may be looking for a 'healthier way' to use substances.

Worryingly, England also has the highest consumption of alcohol within young people globally. According to a recent World Health Organisation (WHO) report, a third of 11-year-olds and more than half of 13-year-olds in England have drunk alcohol - putting it top out of 44 countries examined by global health experts. Girls in England, Wales and Scotland were found to be more likely than boys to be drinking and getting drunk aged 15. The World Health Organization (WHO) report said alcohol, which can damage children's brains, has been normalised. Research shows that the earlier children start drinking, the more serious a problem it can become when they are older. At age 13, the report found 12% of girls and 9% of boys in England had been drunk at least twice in their lives. At 15, that had risen to a third of girls and a quarter of boys. More than a half of girls said they had drunk alcohol in the past 30 days.

Vaping, smoking, alcohol use and drugs abuse are topics covered at an age-appropriate level in PSHEE lessons, within Form periods, and through whole School and Year Group Assemblies. Parents should be aware that the rates of vaping within Essex are rising as the availability of cheap, disposable (and often illegal) vapes increases. Whilst the School will always seek to work with its students to educate them, parents should be aware that students who bring prohibited items (such as vaping products) into School are likely to face significant sanctions in line with our Substance Misue Policy. We ask parents to please reinforce these important messages at home.

ENRICHMENT DAY Friday 20 September 2024

Enrichment Day Overview

What an interesting person is Alison Louise Kennedy of Dundee. Consider the diversity of her achievements, works, and interests. The writer of a number of published novels that revel in the darkness and difficulty of life, these having secured her a string of prestigious awards including the Costa Prize, the Somerset Maugham Award, and the John Llewellyn Rees Prize. It has been said of A L Kennedy that she "knows grimness the way some novelists know music or food". At the same time, she is a highly successful comic on the tough Scottish comedy circuit. Not just a comic but also a teacher (not an unusual combination), Kennedy is an Associate Professor at Warwick University, and a teacher of Creative Writing at the top-performing University of St Andrews. She certainly writes interesting and thoughtprovoking material, arguing for example that "if ever the difficulties of your life seem overwhelming, consider the prospect of being eaten alive by savage penguins and rejoice that such horrors are unknown to you". Or "breathing is supposed to keep you calm, but also it keeps you alive and so you are not calm, because you are alive and being alive is never calm".

Perhaps her most pertinent point, however, is the following: "Have more humility. Remember you don't know the limits of your own abilities. Successful or not, if you keep pushing beyond yourself, you will enrich your own life - and maybe even please a few strangers". Pushing beyond yourself in new areas is at the heart of our Enrichment Programme at WHSB, and the plethora of opportunities to do so continues this Term with our September Enrichment Day. Pupils in Year 7 will have the opportunity to learn more about themselves and their new classmates through a Teambuilding Day, while other pupils will be visiting Duxford (Year 9), the Battlefields (Year 11), and Nuclear Races (Year 11). Those studying in Year 8 can push back the boundaries of Science, and those in Year 10, journalism, while there will also be a range of interesting opportunities for our Sixth Form students. In all these cases, we encourage our Westcliff pupils to follow the guidance of our Learner Profile in being Open to Opportunity, Collaborative and Supportive, and Intellectually Curious, while also having a jolly good time.

Year 8 Enrichment Science Day

Enrichment Day activity for pupils in Year 8 will once again focus on Science, with an opportunity for them to further develop their scientific thinking and practical skills. These are vital skills for any young scientist, as they equip pupils for greater success within their wider scientific studies at School.

Activities for the day will include understanding the Scientific Method, and pupils will enjoy engaging in both practical and research tasks. The Scientific Method has formed the backbone of scientific development since at least the 17th century.

Within this activity, pupils will aim to:

- Understand what the Scientific Method is;
- Draw scientific diagrams accurately;
- Identify hazards, risks and controls;
- Apply the Scientific Method to practical experiments in order to be more robust and objective; and
- Understand that the Scientific Method is important for the global scientific community.

In the practical tasks, pupils will aim to:

- Handle practical equipment safely and correctly;
- Work safely in the laboratory;
- Work collaboratively with other young scientists;
- Learn new areas of Science beyond the scope of the examination curriculum;
- Apply their knowledge to the wider world; and
- Be more confident in conducting practical experiments.

The ability to conduct research is an important transferable skill, whether that be for a project or for one's own personal interests. Within this activity, pupils will aim to:

- Be more computer literate, including using basic software such as Microsoft Word;
- Understand how to research effectively;
- Understand how we determine which sources of information are reliable and which less so; and
- Use sources to influence their own work, rather than adopting a passive 'copy and paste' approach

Year 9 Trip to Imperial War Museum Duxford

On 20 September, the Year 9 cohort will again have the opportunity to visit the airfield and aircraft collection at Duxford, near Cambridge, part of the Imperial War Museum. This is a world-class collection of aircraft, mostly military, along with the Royal Anglian Regiment Museum and the new Airborne Assault exhibition, at a WWII airfield that still retains a number of its original features. It will give pupils in Year 9 an opportunity to put into perspective their studies of WWII in History by seeing some of the technological developments leading up to, and during, the Second World War, and to examine the technological progress from the early days of flight up to supersonic transport and high-altitude reconnaissance.

A number of ground-breaking aircraft are represented, including:

- Concorde pre-production MSN 101 with its flight-test equipment still installed;
- Several Spitfires, some of which are air-worthy, alongside its nemesis the Messerschmitt Bf-109 and the stories of some of the people involved in crucial roles and events of the 2nd World War;
- More modern aircraft and helicopters: Avro Vulcan and York, Shorts Sunderland, English Electric Lightning, Hawker Hunter, Westland Wessex and Sea King;
- American aircraft, including A10 strike aircraft and SR71 Blackbird, alongside a B-52 bomber.

Last year, we were treated to flying displays by Spitfires and a Yakovlev display team, and we would hope to see other aircraft movements, along with aircraft maintenance and restoration projects in progress. We are grateful to the Imperial War Museum, who make available this type of opportunity to school groups free of charge.


The first day will involve a trip to Essex Cemetery, where Canadian doctor John McCrae wrote the well-known poem *In Flanders Field*. Pupils will also be able to see the grave of Valentine Strudwick, the 15-year-old rifleman thought to be the youngest casualty commemorated with a Western Front gravestone. On the second day, we will look forward to another day with historian Andy Robertshaw, historical adviser on 1917

and War Horse, as we explore the Somme and the Thiepval Memorial. We will attend the moving daily ceremony at the Menin Gate, which has been held every day (where possible) since the end of the First World War. On our final day, we will explore trench life at the Zonnebecke Museum, visit Tyne Cot Cemetery, and buy up most of the chocolate in leper.

The History Department at WHSB has been delighted to run this trip for more than twenty years, and we continue to find these sites powerful and emotive, vital pieces of history with which our young Historians can engage.



Upper Sixth Trip to Sizewell

Once again, the Physics department has organised a trip to the Sizewell B Nuclear Power Station for Upper Sixth Physics students as part of our September 2024 Enrichment Day on Friday 20 September.

Sizewell B is a Pressure Water Reactor nuclear power station on the Suffolk coast. Students will be studying nuclear power station design as part of their A Level in Physics, so visiting and touring a working nuclear power station will be a tremendously beneficial experience for them. As part of the visit, students will attend a lecture about how nuclear power stations operate and will have a tour of the facility. They will also visit the turbine room and see – and hear – the enormous turbines spinning at 3000 rpm and transferring enough energy to supply 3.4 million homes on average (the equivalent of nearly every home in the East of England).

LOWER SIXTH GEOLOGY TRIP TO FOLKESTONE

Friday 27 September 2024

This Term, Mr Cooper and I will lead a Lower Sixth field day to study the geology of the coastline in and near Folkestone.

The aim of this trip is to introduce AS geologists to field techniques, with a view to describing and identifying the Folkestone Beds, Gault Clay, and Chalk. From such studies, the rocks can be interpreted in terms of their origins, not least from their rich fossil content, such as ammonites.

The three rocks represent a marine sequence in the region of 100 million years old, which has since been uplifted to form land by the Alpine Orogeny (still going on as Africa collides with Europe). The Mediterranean Sea is being eradicated, but will be safe for a few million years yet!

The Chalk at the Warren, near Folkestone, will also be investigated with respect to engineering geology techniques related to slope stabilization, so that the infamous collapse of the Dover to Folkestone railway line in 1915 will not be repeated.

YEAR 11 FORMATIVE ASSESSMENTS


Monday 30 September - Friday 4 October 2024

THE LAYING OF THE SCHOOL'S FOUNDATION STONE: 100 YEARS ANNIVERSARY

This September marks 100 years since construction began on the site of Westcliff High School for Boys as we know it today. The School was established in 1920 as the co-educational Commercial School, with original premises known as "Belsfield" (a large house with outbuildings) located in Victoria Avenue, Southend. These were quickly outgrown, with buildings designed for 200 pupils in 1920 housing nearly twice that number in 1922, as the demand for secondary education in the town increased with its growing population. Indeed, Southend saw unprecedented growth between 1880 and 1920, close to London as a new commuter town.

Dr Alan White, in his book Westcliff High School for Boys, A Centenary History, explains that it had never been Southend Borough Council's intention for the cramped Belsfield site to be the Commercial School's permanent home. Between 1920 and 1922, plans were afoot to relocate the Commercial School to farmland adjacent to what was then known as Eastwood Lane, WHSB's current site. This land had been purchased in 1914 by the Council, originally with the aim of developing it into a public park. The location of this new site was deemed appropriate for an additional secondary school in the borough, with the most need being for children living to the west of the town. Indeed, the majority of the Commercial School's pupils in the early 1920s lived in Leigh and Westcliff. Also at that time, Southend High School for Boys and Southend High School for Girls were located in Central Southend, either in or around Victoria Avenue. As the planned move gained pace, in August 1922 the Commercial School's name was changed to Westcliff High School for Boys and Girls, in readiness for its new location.

Beset with limited resources and ever tightening central government funding, the original plans for a large new building that was able to accommodate both the boys and the girls had to be scaled back. The final go ahead was given for a slightly smaller design which only the boys would move to, thus determining the future of the two schools in becoming single-sex as opposed to co-educational from that point on. The girls remained at Belsfield


for a further 14 years, moving into their separate purpose-built new school next door in 1938.


In his book, Dr White describes the construction of the new Westcliff High School for Boys building as commencing in September 1924, with the Foundation Stone, still visible today to the east of the Main Entrance, being laid on 20 October 1924 by William Miles, the then Mayor of Southend and the Chairman of the Westcliff Governing Board. Bad weather, resulting in the lower field becoming waterlogged, hampered progress and, although remedial work was carried out at the time, this occurrence is not unfamiliar even today! The new School building was officially opened on 19 July 1926.

SIXTH FORM PHASE 1 REPORTS

Lower Sixth: Friday 4 October 2024

The Lower Sixth Phase 1 Report indicates how your child has settled into their A Level studies. The Report consists of a single numerical grade that represents an attitudinal indicator – a Grade 1, for example, represents an excellent start and highly suitable subject choice, whereas a Grade 4 represents a poor start, and potentially an unsuitable subject choice. Where there are concerns, these are explained further by the relevant Subject Teacher within a short written report.

If necessary, your child can talk to subject teachers and members of the Sixth Form Pastoral Office for further advice and support. The issuing of the Phase 1 Report represents the final opportunity to process subject changes, ensuring that all students have a combination of subjects that best suits their interests and potential.

Upper Sixth: Friday 11 October 2024

The Upper Sixth Phase 1 Report will contain attainment and attitudinal grades for each subject studied. Time should be spent comparing these results to those achieved in the Lower Sixth



Phase 3 Report, and any changes should be carefully reflected upon. The Sixth Form Pastoral Office can offer support and will provide strategies to assist in rectifying any issues before the January 2025 Trial Examinations.

Students will have an opportunity to learn about the natural landscape, local culture, and nature as they make their way through the rugged landscape. The second half of our day will be an exciting kayaking trip up the fjord. Students will paddle their way up the fjord to see the local area from a completely different and unique perspective.

On our third day, we will go on a wild, breath-taking tour of the Folgefonna National Park. The landscape is one of blue-green glaciers and quintessentially picturesque Norwegian scenes. Equipped with snowshoes and walking poles, we will have a guided tour of the snow-covered slopes on the magnificent, third-largest glacier in Norway.

We will finish our trip in Bergen. Despite being Norway's second largest city, Bergen retains a small-town charm. Known as the 'City between Seven Mountains', Bergen is the gateway to Bergen's fjords. It is one of the best-known urban settlements remaining from the Middle Ages. Today, the wharf is home to an array of museums, galleries, shops, and a fish market.

DEAD END: A ROAD SAFETY PLAY FOR YEAR 11 PUPILS

Collingwood Learning

During the Autumn Term, we will again be inviting Collingwood Learning into School to deliver their road safety play entitled Dead End. At the time of writing, the School is awaiting confirmation of the date, which will be announced at the start of term.

This educational theatre and workshop experience for our Year 11 pupils is a key part of our Personal Development Education and is a thought-provoking performance.

The play supports key learning objectives, helping pupils to understand the Fatal Four and how each of these impact on road safety, the disproportionate risk to young drivers and passengers, the consequences of risky behaviour on safety, and how to analyse one's own attitudes and behaviour and manage social influence and pressurising situations effectively.

Below is a summary of the play which is provided in advance of the production by the theatre company.

Synopsis

'Dead End' is designed to help young people engage with the topic of Road Safety from the perspective of both driver and passenger and explores causes and consequences of Road Traffic Incidents. It portrays the horrific consequences of three characters' actions on the roads.

- After one night out with Harrison, Molly must deal with the aftermath of grave injury to herself, and coming to terms with both her actions and the death of a friend.
- Harrison, who crashed the car Molly was in, claims he was not at fault and that he could take drink and drugs and still drive. As the dialogue develops, attempts by Harrison and Molly to deny responsibility are turned on their head. Only then do we realise Harrison's fate that night...

 Tony, who caused death due to distraction, explores the causes for his crash in graphic detail, along with the pain of responsibility for the death of a pedestrian as the result of his lack of concentration whilst driving.

Delivered through incredibly powerful monologues interspersed with theatrical action, and imagery via a projection screen, the audience is guided powerfully through the key messages. We see the build-up to, and consequences of, the crashes.

Designed for this age group, the performance uses a 'talking heads' style approach with graphic descriptions of the accidents and the emotional scars. This performance has been particularly effective as a means of communicating powerfully with Year 11 pupils, who have proved highly receptive to this more sophisticated and emotive approach.

The performance is only one half of the learning experience. Lasting 30 minutes, it moves directly into the workshop which lasts a further 30 minutes.

The workshop helps young people to consolidate and clarify all the issues raised in the play, question the actions and motivations of the characters, and consider what they might do differently in real life.

It is the combination of the engaging theatre and interactivity which creates such a powerful learning experience and empowers young people to make sensible decisions around their own and others' road safety.

We are aware that this play may be distressing for some pupils. If you have concerns about your child participating in this event, please contact the Middle School Pastoral Office in advance.



THE DUKE OF EDINBURGH AWARD AT WESTCLIFF HIGH SCHOOL FOR BOYS



As many pupils and parents will know, the Duke of Edinburgh Award (DofE) is a prestigious and highly regarded programme designed to challenge and inspire young people through a series of activities that promote personal growth, teamwork, and leadership. At Westcliff, we are proud to offer our pupils the opportunity to participate in this enriching

experience, and currently offer Bronze to Year 9 pupils, and Silver to Year 10 pupils.

Benefits of the Duke of Edinburgh Award

Participation in the DofE Award provides numerous benefits for WHSB students. It helps develop essential life skills such as resilience, problem-solving, and self-motivation. Additionally, the programme encourages physical fitness, community involvement, and a sense of adventure. These experiences are invaluable for personal development and are highly regarded by universities and future employers.

Participation Levels and Age Range

At Westcliff, we offer our pupils the opportunity to complete the Bronze and Silver levels of the DofE Award. Each level requires participants to engage in activities across four sections: Volunteering, Physical, Skills, and an Expedition. We typically start our pupils on the Bronze Award in Year 9 and progress to the Silver Award in Year 10. This academic year, we will begin recruiting 48 Year 9 pupils for the Bronze Award and 28 Year 10 pupils for the Silver Award early in the Spring Term. This ensures they have ample time to prepare and train for the Expedition section, as well as complete the required documentation for the other three sections.

Importance of the Physical, Skills, and Volunteering Sections

The DofE Award is structured to provide a balanced and comprehensive experience through its four sections. Each section plays a crucial role in the development of our pupils:

Physical: This section encourages participants to engage in physical activities, promoting a healthy and active lifestyle. It helps improve fitness, resilience, and overall well-being. Pupils choose an activity they enjoy, ranging from sports to fitness training, ensuring they stay motivated and committed.

Skills: The Skills section allows pupils to develop new talents or hone existing ones. This could be anything from learning a musical instrument to mastering a new language or developing cooking skills. It fosters creativity, perseverance, and the pursuit of personal interests.

Volunteering: Volunteering is a cornerstone of the DofE Award, emphasizing the importance of community service and social responsibility. Pupils volunteer in various capacities, such as helping local charities, assisting in community projects, or mentoring younger students. This section cultivates empathy, leadership, and a sense of civic duty.

Autumn Term Activities

This Autumn Term plans to be particularly eventful for our Bronze DofE participants. 



LOWER SCHOOL PHASE 1 REPORTS

Year 7 Reports: Friday 18 October 2024



On Friday 18
October, parents
of Year 7 pupils
will receive their
son's Phase 1
Report. This is an
important report
as it is the first
indication for
parents regarding
how their son
has adapted to
academic study
at the School.
Using the School's

internal grading system, parents will receive an initial indicator in the form of a grade from each of their son's teachers.

As shown in the diagram, most pupils are graded 4a (developed performance), 4b (secure performance) or 4c (foundation performance) in the first half term. This helps parents, pupils and teachers to understand a pupil's current level of understanding, and to identify areas of strength and areas for development.

Year 8 Reports: Friday 8 November 2024

The Year 8 Phase 1 Report is designed to inform parents how their son has begun his studies at the start of this new academic year. Once again, gradings from each of their son's teachers will provide parents with a current attainment indicator. It is expected that pupils will achieve a grade 5a; grades which vary from this will indicate whether a pupils is performing above or below this level.

This report also contains the pupil's Lower School target grade. The average target grade is 7b at the end of Year 9; therefore, if a pupil has a target above this, the School would anticipate that he would be achieving above a 5a. If the target grade is below a 7b, a grade 5a would be considered a strong result. This helps parents, pupils and teachers to understand a pupil's current level of understanding, and identifies areas of strength and areas for development.

The report also contains attitudinal indicators; these are awarded on a scale of 1 (Exceptional) to 4 (Unacceptable). The expected indicator grade is a 2 (Good). Grades of 3 or 4 require a change in the pupil's attitude, and a grade of 1 is awarded when a pupil has exceeded the already high expectations of this School. Parents should consider the indicators received against the explanatory table on the back of the report.

Year 9 Reports: Thursday 24 October 2024

Pupils in Year 9 will receive their Phase 1 Reports on Thursday 24 October. Another important Report, this communication informs parents how their son began this academic year, and it will be critical in influencing GCSE Option Choices, which start to be considered in January 2025.

Again, parents will receive a current attainment indicator in the form of a grade from each of their son's teachers, using the School's internal grading system. It is expected that, at this



stage of Year 9, pupils will achieve a grade 6a; grades which vary from this will indicate whether pupils are performing above or below the target level.

This report too contains the pupil's Lower School target grade. The average target grade is 7b; therefore, if a pupil has a target above this, the School would anticipate that he would be currently achieving a grade higher than a 6a. If the target grade is below a 7b, then a grade 6a would be considered a strong result. This helps parents, pupils and teachers to understand a pupil's current level of understanding, and to identify areas of strength, and areas in need of additional attention.

As noted for the Year 8 Reports, The Year 9 report also contains attitudinal indicators; these are awarded on a scale of 1 (Exceptional) to 4 (Unacceptable). The expected indicator grade is a 2 (Good). Grades of 3 or 4 require a change in the pupil's attitude, and a grade of 1 is awarded when a pupil has exceeded the already high expectations of this School. Parents should consider the indicators received against the explanatory table on the back of the report.

The Next Steps

Following the distribution of the Phase 1 Report, Form Tutors will dedicate time within Form Periods for pupils to reflect on their grades and to develop their goals for the rest of the year. Where a foundation performance has been recorded across a number of subjects, Form Tutors will also discuss strategies to help individual pupils to improve their grades.

Parents should discuss the report and the goals set with their sons, those goals having been recorded in their son's planner. Should there be any further concerns, parents should contact their son's Form Tutor via the Lower School Pastoral Office. There are many mechanisms in place to support pupils, including Pastoral Support, Subject Support, and Mentoring.

ONE HUNDRED ISSUES OF THE WESTCLIFF DIARY 1990 - 2024

In 1990, *The Westcliff Diary* replaced *The Westcliffian* as the School's termly magazine. Since the foundation of Westcliff High School for Boys in 1920, the School has sought to maintain regular communication with its own community through its various termly publications, keeping pupils, parents, staff, alumni and friends updated on School news, activities and events.

The School's first magazine, *The Gateway*, was replaced by *The Quest* in 1931 which, in 1964, was renamed *The Westcliffian*. In 1990, through *The Westcliff Diary*, former Headmaster Mr Baker wished to introduce a more focused commentary on the life and development of the school and, some 34 years on, we are still distributing our *Westcliff Diary*.

With the ongoing need to remain current, and improved access to printing and publication services, *The Westcliff Diary* has continued to evolve over the years. When taking up the role of Headmaster in 2012, Mr Skelly, being an advocate of *The Westcliff Diary* as an effective means for regular communication,

chose to retain the termly publication. He sought to open up opportunities for staff and pupils to contribute articles and other items, and to use this publication as a means for promoting the importance of participation in the wider life of the School. This necessitated a change in format in 2012 and, since that time, the format has continued to develop to address shifting requirements, and the format we recognise today was introduced in 2017.

The School considers *The Westcliff Diary* one of the most important means of communication with parents concerning School updates, reminders, news, and importantly, the calender of events for the forthcoming term. Pupils and parents are continually reminded of the importance of participation in the wider life of the School. Through regular and varied participation, pupils gain self-confidence, extending their knowledge, skills, understanding, and friendship groups. Without doubt, balancing academic commitments with involvement in extra-curricular activity can have a profound impact on good mental health, and academic and future achievements. This message is central to our *Westcliff Diary* today.

The First 20 Issues, 1990 - 1997

Looking back at past issues of the School's magazine not only prompts reflections on the differences, and indeed similarities, between life at WHSB then and now, but also highlights some fascinating shifts in recent decades, in society, and in national and global affairs. It would be impossible to capture this to any great extent in these few pages, but we hope readers enjoy these extracts and accounts from the first 20 issues.

ISSUE 1: SEPTEMBER 1990

Grant Maintained Status

At a meeting on 1 August, the Governing Body confirmed its decision of 4 July to initiate proceedings to enable Westcliff to make a transition to Grant Maintained Status by 1 September 1991.

Grant-maintained (GM) schools were state schools in England and Wales between 1988 and 1998 that had chosen to opt out of local government control. They were funded directly by a grant from central government, much like academies are now. GM status was created by the Education Reform Act 1988, as the then Conservative government sought greater diversity in educational provision, and to weaken local authority control. This status applied to WHSB for eight years.

Following the Government's reforms to Education, the School's Grant Mantained Status was removed on 1 September 1999, and WHSB become a Foundation School. As a result, the School had a closer relationship with the Local Authority, but was still able to retain a measure of independence.

ISSUE 2: JANUARY 2021

School Trips

Three staff and twenty-five boys were preparing themselves for a well-established cycle tour of Holland during the Easter holidays. They followed a route from the Hook of Holland through The Hague, Delft, Gouda, Utrecht, Amsterdam, Alkanaar, Harrlem, Noordwijk and back to the Hook.

In the February half-term three staff and twenty-four boys were to visit Les Deux Alpes, in France, for an intensive week of skiing.

Work Experience

The fifth year [Year 11] had the opportunity to find their work experience placements, with Project Trident, using a directory which was recently included on the Nimbus computer.

ISSUE 3: APRIL 1991

Appeal for Tuition in Typing and Keyboard Skills

The School sought assistance from any parent who would be interested in becoming involved in the teaching of typing and keyboard skills as an extra-curricular activity, to follow up on the work of Mr Boreham (responsibility for co-ordinating IT provision) and Mr Priestley in enabling the pupils to develop Information Technology capabilities.

Student Accommodation Swap Service

The School had recently joined the Student Accommodation Swap Service, an agency established to help first year undergraduates with their accommodation problems during their first year away from home. It hoped that parents living near universities, polytechnics and colleges would be prepared to offer accommodation to another first year undergraduate.

ISSUE 4: SEPTEMBER 1991

Reshaping Speech Day

The formal Speech Day ceremony was introduced, moving away from the previous format of distribution of prizes on the occasion of the autumn concert. Speech Day took place on 23 October 1991 at Crowstone St. George's United Reformed Church. The Guest of Honour was Professor Sir Graham Hills, the Principal and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Strathclyde, and Old Westcliffian.

Our formal Speech Day remains in our School calendar today, and the format is largely unchanged. We consider this one of our most important annual occasions, when our School community gathers to celebrate the outstanding achievements of our pupils, and to award certificates and prizes.

ISSUE 5: JANUARY 1992

Visit of Rt. Hon. Paul Channon M.P.

Paul Channon MP, former Secretary of State for both Transport and Trade and Industry and the Conservative MP for Southend West visited the School to speak to the Sixth Form on 'A Perspective on the Thatcher Years'.



ISSUE 7: SEPTEMBER 1992

Centenary Celebrations in Southend-on-Sea

The County Borough of Southend-on-Sea had reached its Centenary. Many occasions had been arranged over the past nine months in celebration and the School was planning its own contribution - 'The 1892 Show' - between 12 and 14 November. This was to be an occasion to remember, with music, poetry, prose, and commentary from the late Victorian period. The production had been written and directed by Mr Dyer, and involved staff and pupils from WHSB and WHSG.

ISSUE 6: APRIL 1992

A New School Library

Parents were informed that the old gymnasium (considered too small as a gym) would be converted into the School's library. This was an ambitious project, involving installation of a mezzanine floor, and the conversion of the corridor outside the gymnasium into a library administrative area with two floors. The new library would offer 1800 square feet of accommodation on

the ground floor and an additional 650 feet on the mezzanine floor, giving provision approximately twice the size of the School's then library and resources

This space become the School Library as we know it today. Aside from major refurbishment works, undertaken in both 2009 and 2021 to update the facilities, the layout of this space remains similar to the original design in 1992.

ISSUE 8: JANUARY 1993

Staffing

Mr Marlowe joined the full-time cleaning and maintenance staff. We are delighted that, following more than 31 years of outstanding service to the School, Mr Marlow is still supporting us all at WHSB in 2024, as a member of the Premises Maintenance Team.

Civil War in Yugoslavia

Mrs Marlow had sent a letter to parents inviting donations to help the stricken people of Yugoslavia. The response was overwhelming with clothing and blankets being the items most frequently donated. Within the four weeks collection period, a total of 166 parcels weighing 1031 kilograms was collected and sent to Yugoslavia.





ISSUE 9: APRIL 1993

School Trip to Russia

The School noted, "Russia – the former Soviet Union – has been going through a period of immense political and economic change and we were delighted when Mr. Clark and Mr. Culley together with 22 pupils were able to visit Moscow and St Petersburg over the half-term period." The staff and pupils were all impressed by the friendliness of the Russian people, and remarked on their poverty. Ian Holroyd (Year 11) remarked: "The legacy of communism for many Russians is very bitter and the road to economic recovery, development and prosperity promises to be a very long one".

ISSUE 10: SEPTEMBER 1993

Report on Implementing the National Curriculum

Sir Ron Dearing had been asked by the Secretary of State to make recommendations on the future of the National Curriculum and its associated assessment arrangements. Sir Ron, it was noted, had acquired a reputation as a political 'fixer' and he was reporting to the Government on progress towards the implementation of the National Curriculum and the development of curricular and assessment arrangements for the benefit of pupils of different aptitudes and abilities within, and possibly outside the years of compulsory school age. Sir Ron was seeking arrangements which were rather less prescriptive and mechanistic and which would be easier for teachers to administer. He wished to retain national testing, but perhaps not in all subjects.

Lord Dearing (1930-2009) was, it was later reported in the Times Educational Supplement, "Often referred to as education's "Mr Fix-It", Dearing was responsible for cutting back the national curriculum, introducing university tuition fees and, most recently, suggesting an overhaul of language learning."

ISSUE 11: JANUARY 1994

The Russian Exchange February 1994

Although contemporary Russian life continued to be relatively hard, seventeen boys and girls, aged 13-18, and four members of staff from School 231, Moscow, were to visit Westcliff for a fortnight from 13 February. They were to stay with pupils and members of staff, and attend School in the week immediately following half-term. The Modern Languages Department had arranged a programme of events, including visiting the sights of London. On the last night, 26 February, a concert was held in the School Hall.

ISSUE 12: APRIL 1994

Extension to Science Building

An extension to the Science Building had been completed and a formal opening was planned for 24 April. This successful development provided two new laboratories (one for Chemistry and one for Physics/Biology), an additional preparation room, an office and a much larger reception area.

ISSUE 13: SEPTEMBER 1994

Staffing

Mr Michael Skelly, having just arrived from Dublin, Ireland, joined the School in his first year of teaching, as Teacher of Economics.

In September 2003, having by then also worked as Director of Sixth Form Studies and senior leader at WHSB since 2000, Mr Skelly took up a promotion as Deputy Headmaster at Calday Grange Grammar School in the North West of England. He returned to WHSB in 2010, and became Headmaster in 2012.

Mr Bevan also joined the School as Head of Mathematics. Later, Mr Bevan became Headteacher at Southend High School for Boys where he remained for 17 years. He recently retired from this role, in August 2024.

Mr Jimmy Harrison, the well-respected teacher of Physical Education of 36 years at WHSB came out of retirement to teach part-time to support the School. Mr Harrison's (Old Westcliffian) associations with the School had spanned almost 60 years.

It was with great sadness that we learnt that Mr Harrison passed away during the Summer 2024, and many people joined his family to pay their respects at his funeral on 30 August 2024 (see page 144).

ISSUE 14: JANUARY 1995

Tuition in Bridge

The School had received an offer from a local, and accomplished, bridge player who was offering tuition to boys willing to learn the game of Bridge. Lessons would take place on one evening each week during the Spring Term and the probable cost of tuition across the ten weeks of the course would be £25.



ISSUE 15: APRIL 1995

The Information Technology Appeal

An appeal for £60,000 had been launched by Mr. Priestley, the Director of TVEI, on 20 March 1995. The School wished to ensure that pupils had the skills to meet the challenge of an increasingly technological world and had, therefore, decided that every pupil from the age of 11 to 16 should have Information Technology lessons from September 1995. Pupils were also encouraged to use Information Technology to analyse problems in Mathematics, to control equipment in Technology, to log data in Science, and to use the wonderful opportunities presented for research by CD ROM.

ISSUE 16: SEPTEMBER 1995

An Expanding School

The School had begun the new academic year with more pupils on roll (886) than there had been for many years. Due to the large number of applicants for entry to Year 7, the School had admitted an extra Form into the first year, which then totalled 145 pupils. Additionally, 26 students were welcomed into the Lower Sixth from outside the School.

Ecuador Expedition

"One of the more remarkable School visits in recent years came to an end on 15 August when a School party of five boys, fourteen girls from Westcliff High School for Girls, two members of staff and one Expedition Leader returned having been on an expedition to Ecuador for 30 days. The Expedition was a huge success and all members of the party enjoyed the challenge and excitement of the visit, the opportunity to test themselves in extreme conditions, the danger and, at times, the sheer exhilaration of exploring so different an environment in circumstances which were very far removed from the civilization of western Europe."



ISSUE 17: JANUARY 1996

Dining Hall and Music Centre

On 8 January work commenced on the new joint Dining Hall and Music Centre which WHSB and WHSG were jointly taking forward. This project had been planned for some time, and was a substantial capital development. This resource provided, on the ground floor a well-proportioned Dining Hall, generous and well-equipped kitchen accommodation, and toilets. On the first floor, the suite of music rooms comprised three full-sized teaching rooms, six practice rooms, three store rooms, and an office.

These facilities remain similar today, although WHSB now has its own dedicated Music Rooms and no longer shares the original teaching spaces with WHSG, whilst both schools still share the dining facilities.

ISSUE 18: APRIL 1996

Education Evening: The Ofsted Award

In February the Headmaster had written to all parents advising them that the School had been designated 'outstandingly successful' by OFSTED. He offered a brief review of the factors which he believed might have contributed to the Award and, in particular, emphasised the School's belief in offering leadership to pupils, the quality of staffing, the detail of the curriculum planning, the range of experiences offered, public examination success, and the nature of the School's pastoral support systems.

This designated status (awarded remotely) was based on the outcome of the School's formal Ofsted Inspection in September 1994, in which it received the top grade.

Visit to the Royal Festival Hall

On Friday 19 April Mr Moth (Head of Economics) and Mr Skelly (Teacher of Economics) had arranged a special visit for Year 7 pupils to the Royal Festival Hall to hear the London Philharmonic Orchestra perform Elgar's Cello Concerto and the Organ Symphony of Saint-Saëns. Support from the youngest boys in the School was most encouraging, and the School hoped to provide other opportunities for the youngest pupils to hear and develop an appreciation of great works.

ISSUE 19: SEPTEMBER 1996

Booming Sales at the School Bookshop

"The School Bookshop was established over ten years ago by Mr. Lewis and is now enjoying a period of expanding sales. For the second year running, the turnover has exceeded £1,000 and while the revival in its fortunes is not easy to explain, it is undoubtedly true that the advent of cheap classics and reference books has attracted new customers. What is also clear is that the Bookshop's increasingly wide ranging stock of several hundred paperbacks caters for most reading tastes from Year 7 to the Sixth Form."



ISSUE 20: JANUARY 1997

The West Quadrangle Development

"On Tuesday 28 January at 7.00pm we shall open the West Quadrangle Development. The development affords a new room for Modern Languages, two rooms for Mathematics, a room for Sixth Form Information Technology, a 50 seater Lecture Theatre and two offices for staff engaged in pastoral work."

Delays resulted in the opening taking place on 15 May 1997, prior to a School Concert, and parents were invited to attend. This was a significant development, creating much needed additional teaching space, and improving the layout of our School.



Developing our School Site

Ensuring our pupils and staff have access to modern and fit-for-purpose facilities for their learning and teaching is a priority and requires a great deal of consideration, design and financial planning. As admissions to the School have continued to rise over the years, a great deal of work has been carried out to develop our facilities, alongside the significant projects undertaken during each year to ensure existing classrooms and other spaces are well maintained.

SPORT

Issue 35, January 2002

Plans had been prepared and planning permission secured for a new Sports Hall facility. The plans allowed for four badminton courts, a spectator's gallery, a uniturf floor, and electronic scoreboard (provided through funds raised by the Parents' Association), and substantial specialist facilities, including cricket nets. Works were completed during a 12 month period, and the new Sports Hall was named after Mr Jim Harrison, Head of Physical Education at WHSB for 36 years.

MATHEMATICS AND MUSIC

Issue 55, September 2008

The £1.4m Mathematics and Music Block was nearing completion offering, on the ground floor, six large Mathematics teaching rooms, offices and storage. On the first floor, the accommodation included two Music teaching rooms, 5 practice rooms, a Sixth Form study area, and a recording room. This impressive development significantly improved our teaching spaces, and remains in use for the teaching of Mathematics and Music today.

A FURTHER EXPANDING SCHOOL

Issue 70, September 2013

With a need to develop the School site to support an expanding School, plans to invest a total of £4.5million were reported, following success in the recent bidding round for funding from the Department for Education. The development was to include the construction of a state-of-the-art Sixth Form Building, and commencement of a complete overhaul of the Science Block to redesign and modernise both the interior and exterior of the building. The projects were to be phased.

SIXTH FROM FACILITIES

Issue 71, January 2014

Works on the new Sixth Form Building at a cost of £3.5million had commenced. The new state-of-the-art building was to include two large study spaces, including an ICT room for Sixth Form students, a large open plan Sixth Form café and dining area, a large double height Forum area, and offices on the ground floor. The first floor was to include two large Sixth Form Science laboratories, a prep room, four Sixth Form classrooms, and further offices. The School sought to create a space akin to a modern university building, to provide students with an experience which might ease their transition to Higher Education. The new building opened for use in October 2015, and was officially opened by the Duke of Gloucester in 2017. Through this issue, the Headmaster thanked the Parents' Association for donating £10,000 towards high quality tables for the new building.









SCIENCE

Issue 72, April 2014

Works on the first phase of the exterior of the Science Building had commenced, and had been planned to allow half of the Science laboratories to be used for teaching whilst the other half were taken out of use and developed. The first and second phases, focussing on the exterior of the building, included a new roof, curtain walls, glazing, and improved toilet facilities. The works to both phases were completed in the Autumn 2015.

Issue 77, January 2016

Following a further successful bid to the Education Funding Agency, £1.4million was secured to reconfigure and refurbish the interior of the Science Building to meet changing requirements and safety standards. This project, together with the first and second phase projects to refurbish the exterior of the building, completed the works to provide what was essentially a new Science Building for less than half the cost of a new build. Work to provide new laboratories and preparation facilities throughout, state-of-the-art equipment, technology, staff work and office spaces was to begin in September 2016. The project was completed and in use by January 2017.

Our Provision Today

ISSUE 28, SEPTEMBER 1999

A New House System for WHSB

The School Introduced a new House System, with the new House names being Harrier, Kestral, Merlin, and Osprey. The new system was launched with a football competition for boys in Years 7-10. Mr Baker noted that whereas in the past playing football had been confined to those chosen to represent the School, now a greater proportion of boys would enjoy the challenge of competition. House Cross Country was also planned and this would involve every pupil in Year Groups 7 - 10. The competitions would serve to launch both the new House system, and a future in which competition in sport and other extra-curricular areas would be extended to many more pupils.

The designer behind the new House logos was Joe Morris (Old Westcliffian, 1996-2003), being a pupil at the School at the time. In the Sixth Form Joe directed a feature length movie and, having later been employed in various producing roles, he founded his own film production company, Brass Moucstache, in 2010. Filming for his projects, many of which had social or environmental intent, took him all over the world. Sadly, Joe passed away in 2019 and tribute was paid to him in our September 2020 issue of the Westcliff Diary. Joe left his mark on WHSB forever through his superb House logo designs.










ISSUE 62, JANUARY 2011

The Integration of Girls Into the Sixth Form

Until September 2010, pupils at WHSB had been exclusively boys. In the Autumn 2010, Mr Baker reported that 19 girls had been admitted to the Lower Sixth and, in this edition, their integration was reported to have been remarkable, with many of the girls already making a positive contribution to the wider life of the School, including as subject prefects. The girls were congratulated for making a strong impact on the School, as were the boys for welcoming and supporting them with this transition.

This was an important development for WHSB, which had a significant positive impact on the culture of the School. The number of girls in our Sixth Form has grown steadily and, in September 2024, 35 girls were admitted to the Lower Sixth, bringing the total number of girls in the Sixth Form to 75.



ISSUE 67, SEPTEMBER 2012

Establishing The Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Awards and the Combined Cadet Force at WHSB

Mr Skelly reported that both the DofE Award Programme, and a Combined Cadet Force would be established at WHSB following his successful negotiations with both organisations. Mr Depres was appointed DofE Award Coordinator, and Mr Bleakley was appointed Contingent Commander for the CCF. With superb support and drive from both members of staff, these provisions were underway and attracting pupils' interest in the Autumn 2012.

Thirty Year 10 pupils, led by Mr Despres (DofE Coordinator), began working towards their Bronze DofE Award, consisting of four sections: Skills, Volunteering, Physical, and an Expedition. This cohort later went on to complete their Silver Awards in Year 11. With thanks to Mr Depres for his commitment, the provision became firmly established and, in recent years under the leadership of Mr Tresidder, our DofE provision has gone from strength to strength.

In a parallel development, for the first time in over 60 years, a CCF was parading at the School. In September 2012, Mr Bleakly was appointed Contingent Commander, himself a former cadet and Cadet Forces Adult Volunteer. Mr Bleakley held responsibility for embedding and developing the CCF and this he delivered with tremendous success. Readers will know through these pages that Mr Bleakley left WHSB and teaching in August, having given outstanding service to both the School and the CCF.

In the early days of our CCF, the 25 WHSB cadets and Mr Bleakley, became the WHSB Section of the Brentwood School's CCF. Generously (and necessarily in the early days), Brentwood School agreed to support WHSB with its strategies for establishing and funding a CCF provision. Following the introduction of our CCF in 2012, much of the kit and field training opportunities were provided through the support of Brentwood School.

The first Passing Out Parade and Mess Dinner took place on 27 June 2013.

On 8 January 2015, with a special parade, our CCF became independent of Brentwood School, and the Westcliff High School for Boys Combined Cadet Force was inaugurated. WHSB was the first School to avail itself of the Government's Cadet Expansion Programme, and the first to achieve independent status. Just three years later, on 11 January 2018, the School was celebrating the

inauguration of its Royal Navy Section, and Mr Hill was appointed Officer in Command. In 2021, the School received the exciting news that approval had been granted to add a Royal Air Force Section to our CCF, which then became a Tri-Service Unit – the first in the Government's Expansion Programme to do so. The RAF Section was launched in the Spring 2022 and the Inauguration Parade was held on 20 July 2022. Today, with thanks to our outstanding CCF staff volunteers and the commitment from our cadets, we are delighted that our contingent is around 250 strong.





ISSUE 72, APRIL 2014

The Development of our Learner Profile

The Introduction of the Learner Profile in September 2014, was reported in this issue as being an organised acknowledgement of what the School did well, and a means to help prepare pupils for the challenges and opportunities they would meet throughout their lives, both personally and academically. Our Learner Profile, shared by the Headmaster on page 7, is based on his experience of teaching the International Baccalaureate qualification and observing the similar concept successfully applied through that provision. With thanks to all our staff and pupils for their sustained commitment towards our Learner Profile over the years, it has become successfully embedded into every aspect of the School's provision and has been recognised by Ofsted (November 2023) and others as adding much to our pupils' education experience and personal development, and to the culture of the School.



Celebrating 100 Years

ISSUE 89, SPRING 2020

The School's Centenary Year, 1920 - 2020

On 1 January 2020, WHSB was celebrating 100 years since members of our community came together to drive the founding of our School. On the first day our School opened its doors, it was under the name of The Commercial School, based in a converted building in Victoria Avenue, Southend. This was a co-educational school for the town's expanding population. After just two years, the School's name was changed to Westcliff High School and, by 1926, the boys had moved to our present site to become Westcliff High School for Boys, whilst the girls (Westcliff High School for Girls) remained at Victoria Avenue until the 1930s when they moved next door to our current site.

Alan White's superb book Westcliff High School for Boys: A Centenary History, written to mark this important milestone, provides a detailed and interesting account of the School's history throughout its 100 years.

In this issue, the School was anticipating an exciting programme of celebration, and a formal event at the Cliffs Pavilion, Southend to launch the programme. On 1 February 2020, the School staged a spectacular official launch to the Centenary celebrations at the Cliffs Pavilion. This was a remarkable evening, during which pupils, staff and parents were joined by many Old Westcliffians from across the generations, dignitaries, and friends for a formal dinner and entertainment arranged by the School. With thanks to Mr Jeffreys (Director of Drama), Mr Derrick (Director of Music), Mrs Mumford (Assistant Head), and the many other staff who contributed so much to the planning of the event, this was an outstanding success. However, as Mr Skelly delivered his speech and remarked on the School's resilience over its 100 years in facing many challenges, for example its evacuation to the Herbert Strutt School, Derbyshire during WWII, he could not have anticipated that little more than one month later, the entire School would be in lockdown due to the spread of Covid-19.


ISSUE 90, SEPTEMBER 2020 CENTENARY EDITION

From March 2020, it was necessary for the School to move all its teaching, pastoral support, and extra-curricular programme online and this was delivered successfully throughout the lockdown periods. The Summer 2020 issue was replaced by *The Westcliff Week*, a weekly newsletter designed to keep pupils, parents and staff connected during this unprecedented period.

A much anticipated programme of celebratory events for the Centenary Year had to be scaled back due to the lockdown arrangements, but with thanks to so many staff for their creativity and support during this time, much of the 'show went on'. The September 2020 issue of *The Westcliff Diary* was not only a celebration of the School's 100 years, but also a celebration of the support and resilience of the WHSB community in its mobilisation to overcome the challenges of Covid-19 and the lockdown. This included recognition of the efforts of pupils, parents and staff in relation to supporting the wider community with the challenges presented by Covid-19, as well as reflections on the School's remote operation since March 2020.

Our challenges continued throughout 2021, with much teaching, pastoral support, and extra-curricular activity delivered remotely, and the circulation of *The Westcliff Week* continued, replacing the termly Westcliff Diary, until the Autumn 2021.

Whilst the challenges presented by Covid-19 were immense, and this was not the year we had planned for our Centenary, the strength, resilience and creativity of the School community throughout this difficult time was certainly worthy of celebration through this issue.

















The Westcliff Week was circulated to members of the School community weekly throughout periods of lockdown and remote learning during 2020 and 2021 to facilitate communication during this difficult period, and to encourage pupils to continue to engage with extra-curricular activities. As a result, a Summer 2020 issue of The Westcliff Diary was not produced.

AUTUMN SINFONIA CONCERT

Thursday 28 November 2024, 7.30pm - 9.00pm

This term's Sinfonia concert invites audience members on a journey to the wilds of central Asia with Alexander Borodin's *On the Steppes of Central Asia*. Part-time composer and full-time chemist, Borodin was commissioned by Tsar Alexander II of Russia to compose this piece, which was to provide background music to a 'tableau vivant' – an artform involving actors posing motionless for extended periods, like a living painting. Unfortunately, the piece was never performed in its intended context; the performance was called off after an attempted assassination. Now it is a staple of orchestra repertoire.

From eastern wildernesses to 19th century Italy, but through the eyes of a twentieth century British composer, Benjamin Britten's love for Gioachino Rossini's music led him to compose two suites modelled on his work, of which *Matinées Musicales* is the second. Composed in 1941, Britten originally wrote the music for a short film, but later rearranged it as a full suite.

Both compositions are evocative and emotional, featuring in a full orchestral programme of music performed by the School's own Sinfonia orchestra.

HISTORY TRIP TO HAMPTON COURT PALACE

Saturday 30 November 2024

This autumn, the History Department is delighted to continue its programme of History Days Out with a visit to that historic centre of Tudor life and politics, Hampton Court Palace. Our Days Out provide those with a love of History with the opportunity to explore different historic sites in one day visits, and we have been delighted with the popularity of this offer.

On this occasion, we will provide an opportunity to uncover Tudor treasures, glorious gardens, and an iconic maze at this Grade I-listed royal palace on the banks of the river Thames, which is said to have been Henry VIII's favourite residence. Pupils can experience the magnificence of the Tudor palace from the ornate Base Court, marvel at the lavishly decorated State Rooms and Apartments, and see the sprawling Tudor kitchens that once produced more than 800 meals a day for the hungry household of Henry VIII. On this trip, pupils can dare to walk the infamous Haunted Gallery lined with Tudor portraits, where the ghost of Catherine Howard, Henry VIII's fifth wife, has been seen running its length. They will peak into the Fountain Court at Hampton Court Palace and its recognisable red and white facade. Other palace highlights will include the Great Hall, which is adorned with magnificent tapestries, the Chapel Royal, home to Anne Boleyn's Book of Hours, and William III's State Apartments. After exploring the many fascinating areas of the palace, pupils can head outside to wander 60 acres of stunning gardens, which have played host to many popular films and TV shows including Netflix's Bridgerton. They can also

venture into the UK's oldest surviving hedge maze, which has been testing visitors since 1700! The visit promises to be another exciting and adventurous trip, and we look forward to another packed coachload of History tourists exploring yet more of our country's wonderful heritage.

With the shelves bursting with shiny new books from our newly updated Departmental Reading Lists, our School Library continues to grow as a fascinating place to be for scholars of all ages, topics and subjects. All pupils and staff are automatically members of our Library, and able to borrow up to 6 books at a time for a three-week (renewable) period.

But what to read?

We have all experienced that 'blank moment' where we are staring at shelves in a shop and, perhaps blinded by options, can be unsure what to choose to best suit our interests or requirements.

To encourage our pupils to continue in their commitment towards their own 'Lifelong Learning', and to pinpoint their interests, a recent Library lesson poll posed the following questions to pupils.

What was the most interesting conversation you have recently had over the dinner table?

Do you prefer fiction or non-fiction?

What subject or topic do you struggle with the most?

What subject or topic interests you most?

What has caught your eye in the news lately?

What was the last topic you googled?

The answers to these questions ranged from 'topical' or 'current affairs', such as online searches for tomorrow's weather, or sports results, to more probing queries on 'what is a White Hole in space', and 'what is the difference between a nautical mile and a land mile'; our wealth of Library books can provide so much information. The benefit of books is their very presentation, in easily laid-out chapters, which can introduce the reader to new information they may not have initially sought, and this broadens knowledge.



Why not ask your family and friends these questions? In doing so, you might even further your own interests and general knowledge. For example, Mrs Schofield prefers non-fiction, and has a special interest in the history of the 'Titanic' ship (we have several related books in the Library), whilst Mrs Oats, a former Detective, likes to immerse herself in a good thriller or 'whodunnit' from the fiction shelves.

In the coming months we shall be marking the following events in the Library:

- Black History Month
- World Mental Health Day

Every pupil in Years 7, 8, and 9 continues to receive one Library lesson per fortnight with either Mrs Oats or Mrs Schofield. These lessons include silent reading time, spelling tests, quizzes, quickfire book reviews, Word of the Week, opportunities to see our new book arrivals, and much more.

Our most recent reading initiatives have included the Carnegie Book Awards 'Shadowing' Group, which read and voted on the shortlist of eight books, across an entire term, before watching the announcement of the winner which was live streamed from London during one lunch hour in the School Library.

The Summer Reading Challenge, ending in early September, has attracted many applicants, each on a quest to read a set number of classic novels or books all on one theme, for example, sailing, or biographies. Housepoints and book tokens are awarded in recognition of success in the Reading Challenge.

The Library is open from Monday to Thursday 8.00am to 5.30pm, and Friday 8.00am to 4.30pm for silent, individual study and reading, and for perusing and borrowing books. Pupils may visit before and after school, and during break and lunchtimes. On Tuesday lunchtimes, the Library is closed for the running of a growing number of exciting Library based clubs.

LIFELONG READERS INITIATIVE

Pupils join Westcliff High School for Boys with the aim of unlocking their potential. They want to develop their intellectual curiosity and global awareness, to become lifelong learners and effective communicators. They want to prepare themselves for a happy and successful future. There is no better way for them to achieve these aims than by becoming a Lifelong Reader. Extensive research has shown that reading provides a host of benefits: It improves skills of writing and comprehension, general knowledge, empathy, and develops a better understanding of other cultures. Being a Lifelong Reader grants you important cultural capital, and being a good reader makes you a good learner. But these are not the reasons a Lifelong Reader reads.

Reading is one of the most enjoyable and enriching hobbies a person can have. There is nothing like picking up a page-turner or finding an amazing new series of books to steam through. Lifelong Readers read because they love it. The aim of our Lifelong Readers Initiative is to instill a love of reading within the pupils of WHSB. Each term, every pupil in Year 7 and Year 8 will be lent a book. The books chosen are from the literary canon and have been picked for their variety of themes and topics, and because they are challenging. The books will introduce pupils to new vocabulary and develop their confidence as readers.


This term's Year 7 book is *Northern Lights* by Phillip Pullman. The term's Year 8 book is *The Hunger Games* by Suzanne Collins. It is


important that pupils read their Lifelong Readers book, as they will otherwise be left out of discussions and presentations that will take place throughout the year.

However, if this is not possible, pupils will be provided with an information booklet and their three books. This booklet is for parents to inform their son of the content of each book, along with ideas to prompt discussions around the book at home.

THE SCHOOL COUNCIL



Upon joining the Lower Sixth, I was keen to get involved and represent my Form in the School Council. As you progress from Middle School into the Sixth Form, your experiences in the previous years at WHSB make you aware of all the positive aspects of the School, but also highlight ways in which the School can be improved. The School Council is a fantastic way to make the voices of our

students heard. I also think that the new pupils joining the Sixth Form have an advantageous perspective, seeing the School with a fresh pair of eyes and having the benefit of comparison with their previous schools

The Council is split into Lower School (led by Mr Madrid), Middle School (led by Mr Moore) and the Sixth Form (led by Ms Niedziela), with Miss Fairfax overseeing each of these divisions. Each Form sends one to two representatives. The representatives take three 'Areas of Celebration' and three 'Areas of Concern' from their peers to the Headmaster and Miss Fairfax. This ensures the School receives balanced feedback on what students are grateful for, as well as constructive suggestions on how the School might be improved.

Form Groups dedicate a morning session every half-term to debate these six points, and it is always very enjoyable to hear the wide range of innovative ideas proposed, and how other members of the Form react to them. The representatives then meet to discuss which of the three celebrations and three concerns they believe are the most significant from all our Forms' decisions. The successes of extra-curricular activities in Sport, Music, the Charity Committee, and Drama are often celebrated, as are the Subject and Peer Mentoring schemes which forge close collaborations between different Year Groups.

Although many Form Groups often share similar concerns, there is usually a sizeable number of different issues raised. Hence, there needs to be a strict shortlisting process. The Lead Teacher for the Sixth Form, Ms. Niedziela, will nominate two students to meet with the Headmaster and Miss Fairfax during the following week to discuss the six points they deemed most important. After this meeting takes place, all the representatives are briefed on the outcome of the meeting, and which of the points raised can be addressed. We then relay this back to our respective Form Groups.

As a result of these meetings, we were successful in obtaining a second contactless card reader in the Sixth Form Café last year, as well as increasing the supply of chairs in the Forum area. These changes have significantly improved life in the Sixth Form, with shorter queues at lunchtime meaning more people can attend clubs and societies on time. The increase in the number of chairs has improved the social aspect of the Sixth Form Centre.

Last term, Lucas Willett and Maame Asare-Agyapong met with the Headmaster to discuss our latest proposals. We were keen to celebrate the success of the Lower Sixth work experience programme, the effectiveness of the Prefect duty system, and the positive encouragement from our teachers to apply for positions such as Senior Prefect and House Captain. Our areas of concern included limited access to computers at lunchtime, a lack of artefact-based EPQs on offer, and some noise outside some examination venues during the Lower Sixth Trial Examinations. The Headmaster was enthused by the praise our Year Group had for the School, especially the work experience programme. He was also open to the idea of broadening the range of EPQs offered, and allowing the Lower Sixth students greater access to computers. He agreed that any noise in the corridors during examinations was an issue but explained that within the context of the School's day to day operation, this might be difficult to resolve

This snapshot sums up the essence of the School Council. The Headmaster listens carefully to what we have to say. He takes our concerns seriously, and he is honest and transparent regarding what can be realistically achieved and what issues are more difficult to resolve. We are reminded to be practical in our suggestions and to understand the limitations, whether logistical or financial, of some of our proposals. For example, on Year 5 Open Evening, the Headmaster spoke about a suggestion he received for the creation of a swimming pool in the main playground! Logistically and financially impossible, to state the obvious, this is an extreme example of the importance of participants balancing the School's point of view with their own.

The School Council enables us to be team players who are proactive, creative, thoughtful individuals, who maintain a realistic approach to the feasibility of their suggested ideas. I am certain that the School Council will continue to achieve meaningful results for our school community. I would therefore urge you all to consider joining the School Council as early as possible, and get your voices heard.



BOX OF DELIGHTS Wednesday 11 - Friday 13 December 2024,

7.30pm - 9.00pm

What do Harry Potter, the Lord of the Rings, and the Chronicles of Narnia have in common? They are all books that became successful films. They all feature creatures of all sizes, such as the Balrog and the House Elf (a good

boy at the midst of it all (sound familiar?).



The book is the second in a series featuring orphaned schoolboy Kay Harker, stories written by literary great John Masefield. Masefield was a poet, novelist, dramatist and journalist. Born in Ledbury in leafy Herefordshire in 1878, Masefield was fascinated by the natural flora and fauna of this beautiful area, building this rural and pagan life into his novels. After a career at sea and some time in New York City, Masefield returned home already a published poet at the age of 24. Living in rural Oxfordshire, and keeping bees, goats and poultry, Masefield continued to write, his 1923 edition of Collected Poems selling 80,000 copies and bringing him an Honorary Doctorate of Literature from Oxford University. In 1927, he published his first book The Midnight Folk, following this up in 1935 with The Box of Delights. Masefield was made Poet Laureate in 1930, and held this role until his death in 1967.



The story in The Box of Delights has ingredients familiar to any lover of fantasy fiction. Strange things begin to happen the minute young Kay Harker boards the train to go home for Christmas and finds himself under observation by two very shifty-looking characters. Arriving at his destination, the boy is immediately accosted by a bright-eyed old man with a mysterious message: "The wolves are running". Soon danger is everywhere, as a gang of criminals headed by the notorious wizard Abner Brown and his witch wife Sylvia Daisy Pouncer get to work. What does Abner Brown want? The magic box that the old man has entrusted to Kay, which allows him to travel freely, not only in space but in time, too. The gang will stop at nothing to carry out their plan, even kidnapping Kay's friend, the tough little Maria Jones, and threatening to cancel Christmas celebrations altogether. But with the help of his allies, including an intrepid mouse, a squadron of Roman soldiers, the legendary Herne the Hunter, and the inventor of the Box of Delights himself, Kay just may be able rescue his friend, foil Abner Brown's plot, and save Christmas, too.

This modern script adaptation was put together by Piers Torday, the children's author. Torday won the Guardian Children's Fiction Prize in 2014 for The Dark Wild, and followed this up with the completion of his father's unfinished novel manuscript The Death of An Owl. Torday first adapted The Box of Delights for performance at Wilton's Music Hall in 2017, and the show was recently revived by the Royal Shakespeare Company, as their Stratford Christmas play of last year.

We are very much looking forward to staging this Christmas Classic, and look forward to welcoming you into our converted Library Theatre for an early Christmas treat suitable for all the family.

GEOLOGY CONFERENCE *Friday* 13 *December* 2024



The Geology Conference is an annual event to which speakers are invited to present to our Geology students in Years 10 and 11, and the Upper and Lower Sixth, on a wide range of geological issues. Previous topics have revolved around Mining Methods and Hazards; Resources and Exploration; Natural Hazards and Volcanology; and the Permian Mass Extinction.

The speakers often pick up on strands of learning from Key Stage 4, and especially Key Stage 5, stretching and challenging the students whilst also giving them ideas for careers in geology. The speakers are lecturers from Leicester University, or geologists working in Industry, and they can provide information on the latest ideas and research. Old Westcliffians are also invited back to share their university experiences with our students, and to speak with them about university courses and university life.

The afternoon session will be given over to Year 9 pupils, and will include information on interesting aspects of geology, helping them in considering GCSE Geology as an option. Old Westcliffian and Imperial College geologist, Oliver Fuller-Field, attended last year and spoke to Year 9 pupils about his experiences in Geology at WHSB, and at university.

YEAR 11 GEOLOGY TRIP TO THE NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM

Monday 16 December 2024

The Earth Galleries have several exhibitions of interest for GCSE pupils, including *Visions of Earth, Volcanoes and Earthquakes, Restless Surface, From the Beginning, Earth's Treasury, and Hominid Evolution.* During this visit, pupils will undertake written work relating to their GCSE studies; this will include describing and identifying minerals and rocks, investigating the evidence for plate tectonics, analysing surface processes in relation to the formation of sedimentary rocks, logging recent volcanic and earthquake activity, and evaluating the importance of geological materials to a modern industrialised world.





The Earth Galleries do, in fact, cover all major units of study within the GCSE specification, and much more besides. Also, within the adjacent Natural History Museum, pupils will be able to trace the history of the dinosaurs and investigate the origin of meteorites. It promises to be a most instructive and interesting visit.





Entry to School is at Year 7, the School remains selective and therefore applicants need to sit the 11+ examination and meet a minimum score. Year 7 has 6 Forms and 191 pupils, the largest in the School's history, and 80% of these places are reserved for those living in the SSO – SS9 postcodes. Very pleasingly – and this is a vast improvement on the past – the number of boys within the priority catchment area meeting the pass mark and wishing to attend WHSB has been close to or above the number of available places. The remaining 20% of places are available to any boy outside of the priority catchment area and selection is by the highest 11+ score.

Many of you will recall the long jump track and pit located in the lower field. This is in need of replacement after very many years of use by thousands of pupils. It has played an important part in the track and field success of the School's athletes. Old Westcliffian Max Cole and his father Anthony, who is Joint Chair of the Governing Board, are raising funds to support the School in its wish to replace the track. They are aiming to climb Mount Kilimanjaro in Northeastern Tanzania and are seeking sponsorship. Jimmy Harrison, Old Westcliffian



It was with great sadness that I heard the news of Jimmy Harrison's passing. Jimmy left us on Monday 22 July.

Jimmy was educated at Westcliff High School for Boys (1945-1951) before completing military service and attending Loughborough College. He returned to the School as a teacher of Physical Education in 1956, taking over the Physical Education

Department in 1971, and served with distinction for 35 years. In recognition of his service the School's Sports Hall bears his name – The Jim Harrison Hall.

Jimmy was a larger-than-life character who inspired and encouraged many generations of Westcliffians. During his tenure, the School enjoyed considerable success in a range of sports. I know that many Old Westcliffians will have fond memories of Jimmy, not least of the many school trips he ran, be it on tour with a team, skiing down slopes, or cycling through the Netherlands. As a young teacher, I lodged at Jimmy's home, and my own memories are of his infectious enthusiasm, good humour, kindness and passion for sport (particularly rugby).

Every team has its star performers and Jimmy was one of our finest. His positive influence lives on through all those he taught at WHSB and we are immensely grateful for his tremendous service. Jimmy's funeral took place on Friday 30 August and the School's flags flew at half-mast on that day as mark of our respect.

With Our Thanks: Raising Funds for Westcliff High School for Boys

If you have been following our School News, you will know that in the recent English Schools Athletics Association (ESAA) National Final in Stoke-on-Trent our Junior and Intermediate Boys Teams gave spectacular performances, with our Intermediate Boys Team gaining a podium place and coming an impressive Third in the country. No less impressive were the performances of our Junior Boys Team, who exceeded their own target for the day, placing them fourth nationally.

Our athletes continue to train hard in order to maintain their position among some of the best Junior and Intermediate athletes in England. The School's athletics facilities and equipment are now failing badly and the condition of the tartan is so poor that it must now be replaced if we are to provide the facilities we need.



To be clear, our tartan facility is not merely something which is 'nice to have' for our top athletes; this effectively serves as an outdoor classroom for all our pupils. Aside from providing a surface for long-jump and other athletics training, for example hurdles training, this is a surface on which skills are taught to all pupils when engaging in physical education lessons, and it is important for general fitness.

The price quoted for replacement of the tartan facility and associated equipment is an eyewatering £50,0000. You are likely to be aware that funding for schools has been in serious decline for over 10 years, with many schools now in a budget deficit position. We continue to manage our budgets carefully, but without your help will not be able to replace the tartan and other facilities, as there are so many competing pressures on our budget.

I would like to record my sincere thanks to Old Westcliffian Max Cole, and his father Anthony, Co-Chair of Governors at WHSB, who took on the ambitious challenge of climbing Mount Kilimanjaro, Northeastern Tanzania in September this year and, in doing so, set out to raise much needed funding for a new tartan facility. We are delighted with their efforts on behalf of the School and would be most grateful for the support of Old Westcliffians, parents, and friends of the School through sponsorship.

Jack describes himself as "an author, tour guide and blogger". With a substantial following on social media, he now runs his own successful London tour company "Living London History". He has also written a best-selling book "London, A Guide for Curious Wanderers" and produces a weekly newsletter for subscribers to his website.


Jack grew up in Leigh-on-Sea, where his family still live, and with London being so close, spent a great deal of time visiting its various museums, inspiring his passion for history. After leaving Westcliff High School for Boys, he studied a BA in History at the University of Bristol, moving to the South West and living there



for several years. After completing his degree, and four years into a career within hotel management, Jack launched "Living London History" as a weekly blog post back in August 2020. This was somewhat of a pandemic project, with the hospitality industry seriously impacted by Covid-19 and Jack finding himself not having much else to do other than walk around London. To reflect his interest in the history surrounding people as they go about their everyday lives, he started voraciously exploring the city and its environs, and writing about his findings to a few keen subscribers. Jack said: "I started this blog to share my journey discovering London's fascinating past, by walking its bustling grand streets, diving down its mysterious alleyways and strolling along the banks of the Thames. I believe that the city itself is the greatest and most interesting museum of all."

In 2021, Jack took part in Open City's Golden Key Academy guiding course, and in October 2021 he started running his guided walks of London's hidden history. He describes his walks as "focusing on one area of London at a time, with the aim to uncover its stories, point out the little details many miss, really get under the city's skin, and ultimately share my passion for the city's history." In June 2022, having built up his subscribers, Jack resigned from his day job and took his tour company "Living London History" full time, saying he has not looked back since. April 2023 saw the publication of his best-selling book "London: A Guide For Curious Wanderers", Jack describing this as his "guide to London's quirks, oddities and often overlooked details". Beautifully illustrated and containing self-guided walking maps to discover the city, this Sunday Times Bestseller is available worldwide and is currently listed by Amazon in the UK as the Number 1 most gifted book in their Local and Urban Cultural History titles.
